6.1.1 Library Services Report

CAO/Clerk Dillabough reviewed the proposal for contract from the Renfrew Library Board. She highlighted the modern services that the library offers and the number of memberships that Horton residents hold with the Renfrew Library. The cost of entering this agreement would be \$12,000 for 2020. CAO/Clerk Dillabough stated that Horton would be eligible for a \$5,000 grant should the township enter an agreement. The budget does not allocate enough funds presently.

CAO/Clerk Dillabough directed council to the highlighted areas of the policy review. The changes recommended were those highlighted in yellow that were comprised mostly of title changes and references to the Act.

AND THAT once staff have finalized the draft agreement, it be brought back by By-Law for approval.

BACKGROUND:

The existing Recreation Services Agreement between the Township of Horton and the Town of Renfrew has expired as of December 31st, 2018. The Agreement was established so that when the Township pays the annual fee as provided within the Agreement, all Township residents will enjoy the same rights, privileges and access to the recreational facilities, programs and services as the residents of the Town. Kevin Hill, Director of Parks and Recreation presented the Town's proposal to the Horton Recreation Committee on December 20th.

The Town of Renfrew is proposing a charge per user, based on the 4-year average of users. Horton's 4-year average of users is 388.4. Below is the user charge proposal. This information has already been proposed to the Town's Recreation Committee for their review. They have directed Staff to now finalize the proposal and enter into the aforementioned Agreement.

Please be advised that Warwick Township Council adopted the following resolution at their regular meeting on June 17, 2019:

WHEREAS agriculture is the second largest industry in Ontario, contributing \$13.7 billion annually to Ontario's GDP and is essential for putting food on the tables of millions of people here and around the world;

AND WHEREAS in recent months there has been a steady increase in harassment of farmers and livestock transporters by activists opposed to animal agriculture and the consumption of animals;

AND WHEREAS the protests have become blatantly illegal in nature with extremist groups trespassing onto private property, unlawfully entering into buildings and removing animals without fear of prosecution and even promoting and publishing their crimes on social media;

AND WHEREAS maintaining proper biosecurity is essential to ensure the health and well-being of the animals cared for on these agricultural operations;

AND WHEREAS the recent attacks on farmers homes and businesses have resulted in no criminal charges laid, leaving farmers feeling unprotected by the Ontario legal system and afraid for the welfare of themselves, their families, their employees and the animals they care for;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council for the Corporation of the Township of Warwick requests that Hon. Doug Downey work with his fellow MPP's and agricultural leaders to find a better way forward to ensure stronger enforcement of existing laws - or new legislation - to ensure the safety of Ontario's farm families, employees and animals;

The ROMA annual conference was held Jan 19-21 2020 at the Sheraton Hotel. Over 1300 were in attendance.

Trade Show: a wide variety of organizations and businesses - at least 120 in attendance.

Key Speakers:

Senator Rob Black brought greetings from the Senate. He has a strong rural and agricultural background- be sure to follow his Twitter as he is very involved with rural Ontario.

Lieutenant Governor Elizabeth Dowdeswell- focused on how important rural Ontario is for innovation and food production

Rick Kester, President of OGRA- greetings

Allan Thompson, Chair of ROMA- Talked about a proud rural voice and the importance of working together. Rural Ontario is integral to a prosperous Ontario and ROMA continues to ensure that municipal-provincial matters are viewed through a rural lens.

Key note was **Terri O'Reilly** talked about the Power of Storytelling in order to market your municipality. He is a well known broadcaster for CBC and hosts "Under the Influence"; has a huge podcast following with a focus on marketing insights and tips for small and mid size businesses.

Monday morning speakers included discussion of the budget including Premier **Doug Ford** and Minister of Agriculture Food and Rural Affairs **Ernie Hardeman**.

WHEREAS The Municipal Act S.O. 2001, c 25, Section 5(3), as amended provides that a municipal power, including a municipality's capacity rights, powers and privileges under section 9, shall be exercised by by-law;

AND WHEREAS Council desires to adopt a fully reviewed Section G of the Corporate Policies;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Horton hereby **ENACTS AS FOLLOWS**:

- 1. **THAT** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Horton adopt Section G of the Township of Horton's Corporate Policies hereto attached as Appendix "A".
- 2. **THAT** this By-Law shall come into force and take effect immediately upon the passing thereof.
- 3. **THAT** this By-law shall not be interpreted to contradict or violate any statute or regulation of the Province of Ontario.
- 4. **BE IT FURTHER ENACTED**, that all By-Laws or parts thereof, and all or any Resolutions of Council contrary thereto, or inconsistent herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.

BY-LAW NO. 2020-10

A BY-LAW TO CONFIRM PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF HORTON AT THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING HELD FEBRUARY 4TH, 2020

WHEREAS Subsection 5(1) of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, Chapter 25, as amended, provides that the powers of a municipal corporation are to be exercised by its Council;

AND WHEREAS Subsection 5(3) of the said Municipal Act provides that the powers of every Council are to be exercised by by-law;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and desirable that the proceedings of the Council of the Corporation of the Horton at this meeting be confirmed and adopted by by-law;

THEREFORE the Council of the Township of Horton enacts as follows:

- 1. That the actions of the Council at the meeting held on the 4th day of February, 2020 and in respect of each motion, resolution and other action passed and taken by the Council at its said meetings, is, except where the prior approval of the Ontario Municipal Board or other body is required, hereby adopted, ratified and confirmed as if all such proceedings were expressly embodied in this by-law.
- 2. That the Head of Council and proper officers of the Corporation of the Township of Horton are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the said action or to obtain appropriate approvals where required, except where otherwise provided, and to affix the Corporate Seal of the Corporation of the Township of Horton to all such documents.
- 3. That this By-Law shall come into force and take effect upon the passing thereof.
